FreedomFest and Taste of Green Combine for Weekend of Family Fun

The City of Green is combining two great events into one outstanding weekend - June 27 and 28. This year Taste of Green, a festival featuring local restaurants, will combine with the City's annual FreedomFest, a celebration of community and country, at Boettler Park. Admission is free.

On Friday, June 27 from 5 p.m. to 10 p.m., Taste of Green opens with great food selections from a variety of local restaurants. Come enjoy dinner; take a ride in a RE/MAX tethered hot air balloon (\$5 per person; proceeds to benefit the Susan G. Komen Foundation and the Children's Miracle Network); visit Main Street USA, a showcase of local businesses and organizations; stay for live entertainment by Matt Jernigan, a family-friendly comedian; followed by *Karri Fedore and Kerosene*, a rockin' hillbilly blues band.

On Saturday, June 28 from noon until 11 p.m., all the restaurants and vendors from Friday night will be available as well as family activities including inflatables; paddle boats; stand-up paddle boards; Outback Ray's Amazing Animal Show; Irish dancers; NASCAR simulators; and more throughout the day. At 8 p.m., sky-divers will display the American flag as they descend into the park. *Escape*, a Journey-tribute band, performs from 8:30 to 10:15 p.m.



The evening will conclude with the City's annual fireworks display at approximately 10:15 p.m. (Fireworks rain date is June 29).



Beese Family Farm Celebrates 200 years in Green

Merestead Farms, home of John and Lee Beese, is celebrating its bicentennial. The farm, located on East Turkeyfoot Lake Road across from East Liberty Park, was first purchased in 1814 by Samuel Stopher. In 1849, the land was sold to Abraham Foust for \$3,087. The Foust family constructed the side-gabled Greek revival brick farmhouse, which remains today. In 1914, the Beese Family purchased the farmstead, which continues to be a working farm. To celebrate, the City of Green and the Green Historical Society will host a presentation on Green's historical farms August 6 at the Central Administration Building. Dear Residents,

In the next few months, the City anticipates several grand openings. Acme Fresh Market will open at Heritage Crossings in late summer/early fall. Albrecht, Inc. announced that Starbucks, Pav's Creamery, Kasai Japanese Restaurant, Nails 90 salon, Jimmy John's and Sports Clips Hair Salon will join Acme at the Heritage Crossings Plaza. As construction is completed and grand opening dates are announced, the City will share this information through our eNewsletters, Facebook and Twitter. If you are currently not receiving our eNewsletters, sign up at www.cityofgreen.org.

The City also anticipates the opening of health care facilities including the Green Village Nursing Home on Moore Road; the Summa Health Medical Office Building adjacent to their Emergency Department at Heritage Crossings; and the First Green Professional Building at Massillon Road and

SR 619, which is the future home of Akron Children's Hospital Pediatrics, Crystal Clinic and Paragon Health Associates. The Twisted Olive, a Gervasi property located at Southgate Park, is anticipating a fall opening to what should prove to be a destination dining experience.

Green continues to grow as part of a very deliberate, conscious plan. As developers and businesses look to Green for their next expansion, City administrators are looking into the future to make the necessary infrastructure improvements, and add services and amenities residents and businesses desire. Green is a great place to live and raise a family and it is my goal to continue to build this young city into a place we can all be proud to call home - today and in the future. ●

Resident Feedback Positive for Central Park Design Concept

Earlier this spring the City administration invited residents to participate in two public meetings to learn more about the proposed Central Park, an almost 10-acre park located adjacent to the Central Administration Building. In addition to the meetings, residents were invited to complete a survey to share their thoughts, ideas and opinions

about the park and its proposed amenities. More than 250 residents responded and an overwhelming majority support the project, the concept design and amenities. With City Council approval, OHM Advisors is moving forward with final design, incorporating feedback received from residents. Design is anticipated to take 18 months, and construction of the new park is anticipated to begin in late 2015.

Features and Amenities of Central Park

- splash pad wet play area
- a traditional playground
- a pavilion for year round rentals
- a plaza area for seasonal activities - farmers market in summer and an ice skating rink in winter
- an amphitheater
- walking paths
- a boardwalk
- fountain and fishing pier

Construction News



2014 Construction Season Begins

This year the City engineering department is beginning construction of the two-season Lauby Road project, completing construction of the extension of Global Gateway, and focusing on engineering and design of two Massillon Road projects.

In mid-June, the widening of Lauby Road and building the second roundabout in Green at the intersection of Lauby and Greensburg will begin. In addition, the extension of Global Gateway to Greensburg Road will be completed by mid-summer. The project opens up 140 acres of buildable commercial and industrial land as part of Port Green at CAK International Business Park.

In addition the City is designing two major infrastructure improvement projects; however, construction is not anticipated to begin on either until 2017. The first project is the widening of Massillon Road North of I-77 to just past SR 619, including intersection and access improvements. The second project, *The Box*, aptly named for the box created by the four intersections of Massillon Rd./Boettler Rd.; Boettler Rd./Corporate Woods Parkway; Corporate Woods Parkway/Corporate Woods Circle; and Massillon/Corporate Woods Circle. The sequence of construction for these intersections will be determined this year.

"Residents don't normally see the many years of planning that it takes for major improvement projects. Sometimes projects from design through construction can take up to a better part of a decade," said Paul Pickett, city engineer.

Community Feedback Helps Shape Future Improvements

In January, the City hosted two public meetings to discuss the proposed alternatives to improve Massillon Road from I-77 to just north of SR 619. At that meeting and through the City's e-mail and social media blasts, residents were asked to comment on the potential designs. The City received more than 200 responses. Many residents voiced concerns about the proposed roundabouts, while other support additional roundabouts in the City. Here are some anonymous comments we received. Final design plans will be announced in the coming months. ●

"I like the traffic light at Massillon and 619. I do not agree with the statistics on roundabouts being safer. The one at Steese is horrible. People don't yield when coming in and I've almost been hit numerous times if I didn't stop inside the circle to let them in. People like to speed up and cut you off in the circle."

"Roundabouts are statistically safer and proven to help with traffic flow."

"Love the three traffic circles for efficiency plus it gives the Speedway drivers a simple way to get out and get back onto the highway."

"I hate roundabouts. I think they are confusing to many people - especially teens and old people, and they are dangerous. I like the lights and adjusting the grades."

"I like all the roundabouts. I live off of Steese Road & love the one at the Massillon Rd/Steese Rd intersection. I must say I was very skeptical at the beginning, but it's worked out wonderfully."

"Roundabouts will keep traffic flowing. Also, the green space aspect will be aesthetically pleasing."

Fire Division Adds Life-saving Equipment

The Fire Division has added new life-saving equipment to the three EMS ambulances. The LUCAS 2 chest compression devices provide continuous mechanical chest compressions during cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) for adults in cardiac arrest.

"These devices can provide chest compressions to a cardiac victim without interruption, which could not be done previously because medics must stop manual compressions at times to transfer a patient out of the home to the ambulance," said Jeff Funai, fire chief. "When seconds count for a positive outcome for those in full cardiac arrest, these devices will save lives." ●

Zoning Reminders

High Grass

City code requires property owners to maintain their property - grass and weeds on their property can not exceed 12 inches in height. To report a grass violation in your neighborhood, please contact the Green Zoning Division at 330-896-6605 or zoning@cityofgreen.org. The City will contact the property owner allowing them 10 days to comply. If they do not comply, the city will mow the property and invoice the property owner for the cost of maintenance.

Zoning Permits Required for Large Home Improvement Projects

Whether you hire a contractor or are a do-it-yourselfer, make sure you obtain the proper permits for your summer home improvement projects. Zoning Permits are required for structures 30 square feet or larger, and Building Permits are required for detached structures over 200 square feet in size. Permits may be obtained Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Zoning Office, 1755 Town Park Blvd. For information, contact Zoning Division at 330-896-6605 or e-mail zoning@cityofgreen.org. ●

Some highlights from the District Strategic Plan update include:

Collaborative Progress

On March 10, the Green Local School's strategic plan committee provided an update to the Board of Education and community at the Board of Education Meeting.

The planning process, which began in January 2013, encompassed more than 40 community members who were charged with creating goal statements, action plans and outcomes. Academics, Communications, Leadership and Human Resources, Operations, Student Culture, and Technology were pre-determined as target areas to develop and strengthen.

Green High School:

- Green High School is partnering with the Portage Lakes Career Center to explore the creation of a class called Career Pathways to provide students with career mentorship opportunities.

Green Middle School:

- Digital learning has become an emphasis at GMS. Electronic textbooks and distance Learning Labs bring the world to our classrooms.
- Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) - GMS administration and counselors have been trained in PBIS, which emphasizes prevention of student behavior problems through positive interventions.

Green Intermediate School:

- Twenty-six local business leaders were connected to our students through a Career Convention Day, bringing insight into "what it takes" to achieve their career goal. The day exemplified community engagement with business leaders providing real-world opportunities for students.
- Hart Main, teenager and entrepreneur/founder of ManCans, candles with masculine scents, engaged students for a morning session of questions, answers, mentorship and future planning. The morning transcended into an academic adventure of writing, math and social studies.

Green Primary School:

- Third grade classes focus on critical thinking and collaborative learning utilizing legos, iPads and teamwork. For example, students "program" a robot(s) to perform a variety of functions as a culmination to the class, which includes a written and oral presentation.
- Walsh University, University of Akron and Kent State University are providing mentorship, shadowing and volunteer opportunities. A partnership with Child Guidance continues to flourish. Junior Achievement representatives and Mayor Norton are frequent presenters in the building.

Superintendent Jeff Miller expressed his thanks to the Board of Education for having the educational vision to involve our community and staff in the construction of this strategic plan. ●
