## Green Fire Division Turns 75

The Green Fire Division, formerly the Green Township Volunteer Fire Department, was formed in the living room of Marion Babb's home in 1939. Babb, who was elected the first volunteer fire chief, hosted a meeting of concerned citizens following a devastating fire at a hotel located at the corner of Greensburg and Massillon Roads in 1938.

From 1939 until today, much has changed in the way of firefighting. Until 1980, the department was served by volunteers. The first fire truck in Green was created from a former school bus and the fire department was based out of Marion Babb's business located across from his home until 1948, when a station was built at the corner of Greensburg Road and Massillon Road, ironically the site of the former hotel destroyed by fire.

In 1975, Green Township voters passed a fire levy to build Fire Station No. 1 at Steese and Massillon Roads. In 1980 the full-time fire department was established under former Fire Chief Mickle "Mike" Calderone, who served as a volunteer firefighter since 1967. Today the fire division, led by Fire Chief Jeff Funai, has 41 firemedics serving Green.

To celebrate its 75th anniversary and to recognize the men who served selflessly as volunteers throughout the years to protect the homes, lives and property of their neighbors, the Green Fire Division is hosting an open house on October 5 from 12 to 4 p.m. with a brief ceremony held at 2 p.m. ●



## Port Green at CAK International Business Park

The City and its partners recently hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony to mark the completion of Phase III of Port Green at CAK International Business Park. The City and its partners including the State of Ohio, Summit County, Akron-Canton Airport, Aqua Ohio, Development Finance Authority of Summit County and SB Equities, extended Global Gateway 1.1 miles and opened up an additional 140 acres of buildable commercial and industrial land near the Akron-Canton Airport. Available sites in Phase III range from 5 acres to more than 30.

The entire 300 acre park is also designated as the permanent site for Foreign Trade Zone #181, offering businesses engaged in international business potential tax savings. ●

# Storm Water Update

## Storm Water Improvements Continue in Green



On June 18, the City of Green experienced flooding due to a rainfall of nearly 3 inches in an hour. This amount of rain in such a short time frame would tax any storm water system. After the storm, the City's storm water team set out to immediately address roadway flooding. In addition, residential areas that experienced flooding were investigated and prioritized for future repairs and maintenance.

The City is not responsible for the clean-up of any private property flooding; however, the City does log flooding issues and may be able to address any upstream storm water issues to avoid flooding in the future.


### CURRENTLY UNDERWAY

- Installation of larger pipe and expanding ditch capacity at Springdale Road and Steese Road (set to begin in the next two months)
- In-house storm water crew working on service calls and backlog of maintenance items including ditch cleaning, driveway pipe replacements, erosion control, ditch repair, etc. ●

# Useful Tips

## Winterizing Your Rain Barrel

What do cold temperatures and your rain barrel have in common? Nothing! That's why it is very important to winterize your rain barrel. It is a simple and inexpensive procedure that should be completed in fall to prevent damage. With the freezing and thawing that occurs during a typical northeast Ohio winter, a rain barrel can easily crack or leaks may form around the spigot.

To winterize your rain barrel simply drain and disconnect it from the downspout. Store it away for the winter in your garage, basement, or storage shed. If you choose to keep it outside, unscrew the spigot(s) and place a heavy object, such as a large brick, inside to weigh it down. Place all of the components inside the barrel and replace the original solid cover to prevent rain and snow from collecting inside the barrel. Or turn the barrel upside down and place a heavy object on top to weigh it down and prevent it from blowing over.

The final step is to reconnect the original down spouting on the house to run roof water away from your house and its foundation. ●

## Being WaterSmart Can Help You Save Big On Your Water Bill

It seems like fresh water is abundant but it's actually very rare, and it's essential that we conserve this precious resource. A few small adjustments around your home can make a big difference, saving hundreds of gallons of water every month.

1. **Replace or retrofit your old toilet.** Upgrade to a dual-flush model or buy a dual-flush handle kit for your existing toilet. A new dual-flush model uses as low as .8 gallons compared to up to 5 gallons for older models.
2. **Install high-efficiency appliances** especially dishwashers and washers. New front-loading washing machines use 50 percent less water than many old top-loading models.
3. **Add aerators or other low-flow retrofits to your shower and faucets.** Aerators add bubbles to the flow of water to reduce water use without losing pressure. You'll barely notice a difference!
4. **Fix leaks right away,** and don't forget to check for sneaky toilet leaks.
5. **Conduct a whole-house water audit.** It's easier than you might think. You can identify even the most sneaky water-robbers overnight by making a note of the numbers on your water meter before you go to bed at night and checking them again first thing in the morning. If the numbers change while you sleep, you have a leak somewhere in the house.

## Student Achievement

### New World Language Offerings This Year

New World Language offerings are improving and growing in the 2014-2105 school year. Through creative scheduling and cost-savings in other curricular areas, the district has added French into the middle school and high school programs. In addition Exploratory Spanish is available to all 5th and 6th graders at Green Intermediate School.

- All seventh grade students continue their exploratory experience in Spanish and are introduced to French.
- Approximately 60 eighth grade students are enrolled in French 1 for high school credit.
- Approximately 60 eighth grade students are enrolled in Spanish 1 for high school credit.
- GHS is offering two sections of French 1 this year and expects to add French II, III and IV over the course of the next three years.

### 100 Percent Passage Rate for 3rd Grade Reading Guarantee

In order to be in compliance with Ohio's Third Grade Reading Guarantee (TGRG), all third grade students in Green Local Schools take the Ohio Achievement Assessment in Reading each fall and spring. Of Green's 322 third graders in the 2013-2014 school year, 97.5 percent scored at or above the state's cut score of 392 - the second highest scoring percentage for the first round of testing in Summit County.

TGRG is a program to identify students from kindergarten through Grade 3 who are behind in reading. School districts are required to guarantee students are on track by third grade, and ensure every struggling reader receives the support needed to learn and achieve. Passage of the TGRG is required for promotion to the fourth grade.

For the small percentage of students who did not meet the requirement, tutoring and reading intervention was provided in early summer along with subsequent testing, which resulted in 100 percent student passage rate for 2013-2014 school year. Congratulations to our students, staff and parents for this outstanding student achievement! ●

## Student and Staff Climate



### MARCS Security Training

Student and staff safety is a priority at Green Local Schools. In late August, more than 25 district administrators and staff participated in a Multi-Agency Radio Communication System (MARCS) training for in-school emergency communication facilitated by Summit County Sheriff Sergeant Leonard Fanelly. Each district building has a radio unit which provides public schools instant communication to first responders in moments that matter. The radio units were purchased through a grant administered by the Ohio School Facilities Commission.

## PLCC Receives Grant to Increase RAMTEC Training

Portage Lakes Career Center (PLCC), a career and technical school for both high school students and adult learners located on Shriver Road, received a \$1.5 million grant through Ohio's Straight A Fund to develop a Robotics and Advanced Manufacturing program designed to meet the needs of employers in Northeast Ohio. This grant will allow PLCC to partner with eight other career centers to expand

and continue the vision of RAMTEC (Robotics & Advanced Manufacturing Technology Education Collaborative), a successful program first started at Tri-Rivers Career Center in Marion, OH, by providing high school and adult students with advanced manufacturing and engineering training.
